Spencer Hired to Lead Society Music Programs

Executive Director Ed Watson taps dynamic musician to lead Society music programs

Rick Spencer has accepted the position of Director of Music and Education for the Barbershop Harmony Society.

"Every current and future member of this organization should be given the opportunity to experience barbershop harmony the way he wants it," said Spencer. "I'm looking forward to leading a team of staff and volunteers in expanding and developing educational programs to enrich the experience of all Barbershoppers.

"These are exciting times for the Barbershop Harmony Society. Our Youth In Harmony and Collegiate Development programs continue to grow due to the efforts of the music staff and the countless volunteers involved each year. We are developing programs to build on this groundwork, to work more closely with other *a cappella* and music organizations to get more young people singing and enjoying the experience that *a cappella* music offers.

"When you get right down to it, it's all about experiencing the music together, with people who enjoy singing this music as much as you do. That's the very heart of the traditions and fraternal aspects of the Barbershop Harmony Society, core values lived deeply by heroes I follow: Joe Liles, Mel Knight, Greg Lyne."

A 17-year member of the Society, Spencer started barbershopping at the age of ten, and has directed choruses, sung in international-caliber quartets, coached, and taught throughout North America and Europe. Prior to his appointment, Spencer traveled extensively in the United States, Canada, and abroad for the Society as a music educator, specializing in youth development programs. In his new role, Spencer will direct the operation of all music education programs and activities which promote the preservation, education, and growth of barbershop singing; oversee the Old Songs Library; operate the annual Harmony University; and manage the music recording, licensing, and publishing activities for the Society.

"Rick Spencer is a fine musician, vocalist, arranger, teacher and extremely well organized," said Joe Liles, a past Executive Director who has served as Interim Director of Music Education the past eight months. "He is in touch with youth and has great vision for the future of the Society. He has already proven himself to be a good manager. I'm looking forward to working with him in his new capacity."

Antique Gold Wins Seniors' Quartet Contest

Like sons, like father: bringing home the gold

Sacramento, CA, Jan. 21–Antique Gold of Greater Vancouver, B.C., took the gold this afternoon in the hotly contested Barbershop Harmony Society's international seniors quartet competition. Only two points separated Antique Gold, with a score of 856 points, from the second place

Vintage Gold of California's Bay Area. Only four points made the difference between first and the third- place Chicago Times of the greater Chicago area. A total of 26 quartets from the U.S., Canada, Sweden, and England competed in the annual contest.

This may be the first time that a father and his sons won their respective competitions within months of each other. Members of Antique Gold are tenor Tom Bates, 70; lead George Wakeham, 63; baritone Charlie Metzger, 59; and his brother bass George Metzger, 58. Charlie and George are father and uncle, respectively, of Tom and Mark Metzger, two members of Realtime, the quartet that swept the regular quartet internationals last July.

Members of Vintage Gold are tenor Ron Bass, 64; lead Gary Bolles, 58; baritone Pat Henley, 69; and bass Jim Sherman, 67. Chicago Times members are tenor Ray Henders, 77; lead Eugene Koth, 61; baritone Dave Cowin, 67; and bass Dave Boo, 59.

Rounding out the top five medallist positions are the following:

- Fourth place: Play It Again! from Ottawa, Ontario—tenor Rod McGillivray, 67; lead Jim Whitehead, 71; baritone Andre Carriere, 65; and bass Bill Vermue, 57.
- Fifth place: Silver Chords of Bellevue, Washington—tenor Dave Brasher, 70; lead Les Walter, 63; baritone Barry Knott, 59; and bass Dick Swanson, 76.

No member of any competing seniors quartet may be younger that 55, and the cumulative age of the quartet must be 240 years or more. They are judged on presentation, singing and music.
