# Editorial Let's Learn From The First Ladies

Every Tuesday, the "Life" section of the Poughkeepsie Journal contains a page called "Verge," directed chiefly at teenagers. The left-hand column of the page, called "TeenAges," always consists of an article written by a teen-ager. On the morning of 22 February, the author was a girl named Laura Doe, a senior at FDR High School and a member of their a cappella group The First Ladies, who have appeared on our annual show. Laura told about some of her experiences with the group, and about her feelings growing out of that experience. She is clearly an exceptionally astute young lady, and part of her column says something that the Newyorkers could well take to heart. Here is what she said:

"... [W]e spent lots of time practicing the competition songs as if we really had a judgmental audience watching us perform. This meant increasing our energy level, body movement and use of dynamics—a big transition from our previous performance style of mostly just standing around and singing.

"One of the differences between a great group and a so-so group is the amount of energy brought to the performance—you obviously can't entertain people with a deadpan face and stiff body movements."

(Jan. 29)—Texoma Sound swept the 2005 Barbershop Harmony Society International Seniors Quartet Contest today, beating out 23 other competitors and achieving the highest score in the last several years. The contest was held in conjunction with the Society's annual midwinter convention this past week in Jacksonville.

Members of Texoma Sound are tenor Frank Friedemann of Tulsa, Okla.; lead Jim Casey of Denison, Texas; baritone Bill Thompson of Stillwater, Okla.; and bass Tom Pearson of Houston, Texas. They scored a total of 909 points. The quartet represented (See "Winners" on Page 5)

the Society's Southwestern District.

Second place was won by Savoir Four of Illinois; third went to Antiques Roadshow of Michigan; fourth to Talisman of Illinois; and fifth to Antique Gold of the Greater Vancouver Area, British Columbia.

Like all members of the Society, competing quartets sing barbershop harmony as a hobby. In "real life," Texoma Sound's Friedemann, 61, is a counselor–public relations manager for Musgrove-Merriott-Smith Funeral Service; Casey, 66, is a self-employed vocal music instructor; Thompson, 68, is assistant sales and service manager for General Motors Corp.; and Pearson, 63, is an orthodontist.

No member of any competing seniors quartet may be younger than 55, and the cumulative age of the quartet

must be 240 years or more. They were judged on presentation, singing and music.

Members of Savoir Four are tenor Rick Anthoney, 59; lead Dick Bek, 65; baritone Lynn Hauldren, 82; and bass George Sotos, 58. Hauldren was honored as the oldest competitor.

Antiques Roadshow members are tenor Raleigh Bloch, 71; lead Dennis Gore, 62; baritone Roger Lewis, 67; and bass Lee Hanson, 73.

Talismen members are tenor Gene Woolcott, 65; lead Chuck Sisson, 57; baritone Dick Kingdon, 62; bass Edward Chapman, 64.

Members of Antique Gold are tenor Tom Bates, 69; lead Wally Coe, 63; baritone Charlie Metzger, 58; and bass George Metzger, 57.
